Welcome to our first electronic version of Volkssport Canada. Those of you holding subscriptions who have donated the remainder of their subscription to CVF will be acknowledged for the donation. Our next edition in March, 2013 will be an annual report with reports from the Board and Executive. In the past we have published an annual report at the annual cost of about \$200. In October 2012, the Board voted to discontinue this printing and to publish the reports in Volkssport Canada.

The final numbers of walkers completing the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Walk Program are still to be compiled. Remember, you must get these sheets into the CVF office by December 31. Now walkers can concentrate on the Winter Walking Program and the new Program: Trans Canada Trail Program which starts January 1, 2013. The stamp sheet for the Trans Canada Trail Program is found on the CVF website (www.walks.ca) under Resources, Documents (Individual). Print off the form, get the 20 stamps and send \$5 with your completed sheet to get a certificate and acknowledgement in Volkssport Canada.

I attended the IVV Congress of Delegates in China October 20 – 21 and with Jane Fawcett, we had three votes for the meeting. Congratulations to Benoit Pinsonneault who was voted to the IVV Disciplinary Board. The next Congress of Delegates will be in Hamburg, Germany in September, 2014. The next IVV Olympiad will be in Chendu, China, September 24-27, 2015 but before that the IVV Olympiad 2013 will take place in Val Gardena, Sud Tyrol [South Tyrol, Italy] – June 25 - 29, 2013. It is always interesting to attend these events to meet walkers from all over the world.

The Congress also voted to accept the IVV - America as one of the Continental Organizations. Canada and Brazil are founding members. AVA will make the decision as to whether they will join or not at their next AGM in May, 2013. IVV has already formed IVV - Europe and IVV -Asia and has delegated sanctioning of walks to the new organizations in their areas. Our area will be the Americas, the Caribbean and South Pacific. The organizing committee for the establishment of IVV - Americas has included Curt Myron, Past AVA President and Ayrton Violento, Brazil who continue on the Committee. Thanks to Graham Fawcett and Benoit Pinsonneault who have been Canada's representatives. Now I will be joining the Committee. The goal is to promote IVV within our area and to keep costs for this new organization to a minimum. IVV has provided a grant to the Organization. The Committee is still redrafting the Bylaws. I'll keep you informed of the Committee's plan of action which will be developed in the next few weeks.

Our first telephone conference AGM will be held Sunday, April 7, 2013 (15:00 Eastern Standard Time). Your Club should have received the documents pertaining to the meeting. Let's have every Club participating in the conference call.

The Board has just confirmed the membership fee for 2014 at \$4 per adult member. We have been able to keep this cost at \$4 for both 2013 and 2014.

La feuille pour étampes du Programme du Sentier Transcanadien est disponible sur le site FCV (www.walks.ca) sous la rubrique Ressources, Documents (Individuel). Imprimez le formulaire, obtenez les 20 étampes et envoyez \$5 avec votre feuille remplie pour obtenir un certificat et une reconnaissance dans Volkssport Canada.

J'ai assisté au Congrès des délégués IVV en Chine les 20 et 21 octobre et avec Jane Fawcett, nous avions trois votes pour l'assemblée. Félicitations à Benoit Pinsonneault qui a été élu au Conseil de Discipline IVV. Le prochain Congrès des délégués sera à Hambourg, Allemagne en septembre 2014. La prochaine Olympiade IVV sera à Chengdu, Chine, 24 - 27 septembre 2015, mais avant il y a l'Olympiade IVV 2013 à Val Gardena, Sud Tyrol [Tyrol du Sud, Italie], 25 - 29 juin 2013. Il est toujours intéressant d'assister à ces événements ou l'on rencontre des marcheurs de partout dans le monde

Le Congrès a également voté en faveur de l' IVV - Amérique comme l'une des organisations continentales. Le Canada et le Brésil sont des membres fondateurs. AVA prendra la décision quant à savoir si ils vont adhérer ou non, à leur prochaine AGA en mai 2013. IVV a déjà formé IVV - Europe et IVV - Asie et a délégué la sanction des marches, pour leur région, aux nouvelles organisations. Notre région sera les Amériques, les Caraïbes et le Pacifique Sud. Le comité organisateur de la mise en place de IVV - Amériques a inclus Curt Myron, ancien président AVA et Ayrton Violento du Brésil qui continuent au sein du Comité. Merci à Graham Fawcett et Benoit Pinsonneault qui ont été les représentants du Canada. Maintenant, je vais joindre le Comité. L'objectif est de promouvoir IVV au sein de notre région et de réduire les coûts de cette nouvelle organisation au minimum. IVV a accordé une allocation à l'organisation. Le Comité en est toujours à réviser les règles. Je vous tiendrai informé du plan d'action du Comité qui sera élaboré dans les prochaines semaines.

Notre première conférence téléphonique AGA aura lieu le dimanche, 7 avril, 2013 (15:00 heure de l'Est). Votre club doit avoir reçu les documents relatifs à la réunion. Faisons en sorte que tous les clubs participent à la conférence téléphonique.

#### Vice President's Report



Happy New Year to you all. Last year was a busy year for all of us and for walkers across the country. I have been working on a few projects as part of the Board of Directors;

- a) <u>CVF Office</u> we have had trouble locating a new office space for the CVF office in Ottawa, so for now we are still going to be in the current office. Unfortunately, this means a slight increase in rent. We will continue it try and find something more suitable and within the budget. The Office retail spaces in Ottawa are usually on the 500 sq ft and up, and all we need is 350 sq ft, so it has made the searching a little more difficult.
- b) <u>CVF Office Clean-up</u> Donna and a couple of volunteers have been making progress in reducing the amount of old/ obsolete items that are being stored in the office. There are two reasons for this clean-up, firstly legal requirements (7 year retention of records), and of course to reduce our storage footprint. This is an ongoing effort.

Other Items that I have been trying to get off the ground;

a) <u>CVF on Facebook</u> – (http://www.facebook.com/groups/ VolkssportCanada/) I have added to and am expanding the information on Rollie Combs original Facebook page to include a listing of ALL CVF Sanctioned walks for 2013 (from information dated 30 Dec 2012). I will be adding 3 months at a time of covering ALL of Canada. Also there are a few articles attached to the page and Rollie has been adding Pictures.



- b) IVV Americas on Facebook (http://www.facebook.com/groups/553747864639128/?ref=ts&fref=ts) working with Curt Myron on making sure this page provides the information needed to explain and to create the Continental Association. There is a lot of info on the page about what its function is and is worth the visit.
- c) Participation Canada (http://www.participaction.com/) In the final steps to preparing and sending Participation a list of all CVF events for 2013. This will be added to their Events schedule on their web Site. I have used this in the past few years to highlight NCR walks, and since I have the CVF listing I figured it should go out and hopefully we gain a bit of interest.
- d) Map My Walk I have been using this application on my smart phone to map my CVF walks when I go out with the clubs. But this piece of technology can also we used to set up trails and validate distances. I will be putting something on the Facebook page on how this all works. If you go to www.mapmywalk.com and do a search for maps with 'CVF' in them you should find around a 100 walks I' ve done with the Ottawa and Kingston clubs. This technology could be expanded to help our Personal walking program for people who don't have access to a club or local walks. More to follow on this in the upcoming months.

We are also looking into how to exploit other social media sources to get the word out about our clubs so the New Year will be adding more interesting challenges for us as an organization to get the word out about how Walking/Volkssports is good for your health, and your community.



the Ottawa Carleton Clubs of Ottawa for hosting a fabulous weekend. Over 400 people participated in the walks, meetings and social events.

This was the first year for the mail in registration for 13 of the Ontario Director's walks. Although it was a learning curve I was pleased with the registration of 133 people. Effective in 2013 the Stirling walk will no longer be an YRE and become a seasonal walk from May 1st to October 31st. The Kitchener/Waterloo walk at RIM Park will be discontinued in 2013.

The King's Town Trekkers have had a success ful year thanks to the CVF Annual General meeting which saw many additional walkers taking advantage of the Trekkers YRE's and Spring Special walks. They are well into their winter walking schedule with walks on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month. Their AGM was held on November 15th with a dinner and meeting, which resulted in the election of a new President Mary Beth Gurr. Welcome aboard Mary Beth. Club membership remained about the same for 2012.

The Ottawa Voyageurs finished their summer series of Tuesday evening walks with their Camillo's Bar and Grill walk. On September 28th the club had their Annual Walk followed by the club's annual charity walk "Move Your Feet so Kids Can Eat" which raises funds for the Orleans Cumberland Resource Centre. October 27th the Voyageurs celebrated the CVF's 25th Anniversary Walk with a "Walk Till You Drop" walk in which you can walk as many kilometers as you could. On November 5th the Voyageurs joined with the Nepean Nomads for a Volunteer Appreciation walk and lunch. At this event Benoit Pinsonneault and Donna Sullivan received IVV awards from IVV Vice President Graham Fawcett. The Voyageurs wrapped up the year with their annual Christmas Dinner Nov 25th at Ruby King restaurant in Orleans and their Christmas Lights walk on December 16th.

The Nepean Nomads had a very busy year. They had 5 event walks for the final quarter, Merrickville Artist Tours (37 walkers), Autumn Leaves Walk and Breakfast (68 walkers) Soft Shoe Shuffle (41 walkers), Hunters moon (31 walkers) and the Volunteer Appreciation with a total of 57 walkers. To date they have had 1331 walkers for a total of 11074 km. They offered a seminar at New Balance in which 13 members attended and had a bowling night on Dec 6th for 20 members.

The Gateway Walkers have been doing weekly walks, which have secured some new members. The club has been privileged to have pictures from their walks published in the Near North Senior monthly publication. Their Strawberry Festival in Sturgeon Falls was featured on the front page. Bernard Giroux, a member of the club created a 5 & 10 km walk passing the St. Joseph Motherhouse that was a great success and it will be repeated in 2013. The club started the New Year with their 10th Annual New Year's Eve Party a catered meal and evening of fun. The club is still looking to fill some of their executive positions.

The Nickel City Walkers, Temiskaming Wanderers and Ar-

gosy Rovers reported a successful year.

The Niagara Falls and Niagara on the Lake walks will now become Ontario Director's walks for 2013.

A meeting of the WVAO (Walking Volkssport Association of Ontario) was held at the convention where the Ontario Clubs and Associations voted to combine the positions of the Ontario Director and the President of the WVAO. On Sunday October 14th the AGM for the WVAO was held in Kingston ON. The next meeting will be held in Ottawa on February 10th.

#### How I Celebrated CVF/FCV's 25th Anniversary in 2012

In the Apr-May-Jun 2012 issue of *Volkssport Canada*, I suggested "Some Ways to Celebrate CVF/FCV's 25th Anniversary." Here's the follow-up article.

## 1. complete the CVF/FCV 25th Anniversary Participation Challenge (with guided/map walks rather than YRFs)

I expanded this goal to include as many special 25th Anniversary walks as I could. Of the 29 offered by different clubs across Canada, I participated in 19, in 6 different provinces.

BC: Comox, Esquimalt x 2, Ladysmith, Qualicum Beach, Saanichton, Spectacle Lake, Surrey, Vancouver

AB: Edmonton, Mulhurst Bay, Whitecourt

SK: Regina

ON: 2-day event along St. Lawrence River, Ottawa, Sudbury

QC: St-Augustin NS: Halifax

It was great to walk with so many people across the country. I couldn't have done some of these events without the help of local club members who offered rides and even accommodation. You know who you are — many thanks again for helping me out!

#### 2. do 25 different YREs

As long as I do the YREs in Hope and Whistler in December, I will have done 25 YREs outside Metro Vancouver this year. [I confess that, during a second trip to both Ottawa and Edmonton, I repeated a YRE number, but I did a different route.]

### 3. speak to at least 25 new or prospective Volkswalkers

I introduced myself and talked with many newcomers at Metro Vancouver Volkswalks.

During the year, I received over 30 phone calls inquiring about Volkswalking. These were mainly in response to frequent announcements in community newspapers about upcoming events. Not many of the people actually came out for a walk, but at least four have joined a local club.

#### 4. do one 25K walk a month

I managed to complete this goal in a variety of ways. Some months, I did a YRE two and a half times. On five occasions, I did 25K on the day of a 25th Anniversary event. The longest walk I did was the 32K "Galloping Goose" event on southern Vancouver Island. My "biggest" month was August when I did four 25K walks within five days.

Although I didn't get Volkssport credit, a separate personal long-distance challenge in 2012 was to walk the perimeter of the Island of Montreal in six days of around 25K each day. This was completed (with my Montreal brother) during four different visits with family.

## 5. list at least 25 different birds and/or animals seen during Volkssport events (The most interesting so far have been a golden-crowned kinglet and a harbour seal.)

During Volkswalks in 2012, I saw at least one (and sometimes many more) of the following.

**Birds:** American widgeon, bald eagle, black-capped chickadee, bufflehead, Canada goose (and many goslings), downy woodpecker (or pic mineur because I saw one in Québec), goldfinch, great blue heron (swallowing a fish!), killdeer, kingfisher, mallard duck, northern flicker, raven, snow goose, swan, turkey vulture, varied thrush

**Animals:** belted highland cattle, chipmunk, coyote, deer, Douglas squirrel, garter snake, groundhog, hare, miniature horse, rabbit, snapping turtle

\* \* \* \* \*

I had a good time reaching my special goals in 2012; however, my goal for this year is much simpler: to do 20K of Volkswalking each week.

#### Europiad 2012

What do a Roman soldier, a Roman lady, a Benedictine monk, a Viking and a walker have in common? And what significance did they hold for the Europiad? These were the mascots for the first Europiad as the theme for the walks on Friday and Saturday in both Echternach and in Irrel were "Following the footsteps of the Benedictines and Romans". These mascots in cariature were featured on the backs of the Europiad t-shirts available for purchase. Members of the two federations organizing the weekend dressed in these costumes for various events such as the Opening and Closing Ceremonies and parades.

Graham and I attended the first Europiad held in Echternach, Luxembourg and Irrel, Germany from September 7 to 9<sup>th</sup>. Attendance for the three days was rumoured to be close to 10,000 people but in fact, it was closer to 6,300. People came from all over Europe, Asia, Canada, UK and the United States. Echternach is a small medieval town of about 5,500 people in a valley surrounded by the Sauer River, red pine forests and farmlands. It is also at the entrance to what is called "Little Switzerland" on the Mullerthal Trail and in the German-Luxembourgish Natural Park.

Our first walk in Echternach was with Ottawa walking friends: Heather Briggs, Pat de Roche, Jane and Sally Hare who were travelling with Walking Adventures International. We met outside of the Trifolion Cultural Centre by chance and walked together on the President's 5 km walk. This walk took us through the Benedictine Abbey grounds, past a two story stone folly surrounded by a gorgeous garden, along the Sauer River (with Germany across the river), on a shaded pathway, past campgrounds, to a Youth Hostel that was the checkpoint. Here Graham met up with two Brits that we had met in years past, got our cards stamped and could have stayed to have a beer on the patio as others did. Instead, we continued down the path for a few minutes coming to a small glass museum on our right and a set of stairs to a lookout. At the lookout, we saw in front of us magnificent excavations of a large Roman villa complete with a reflecting pool filled with water. At one end of the excavations was a set of very tall white stone columns that would have been ornamental on the outside of the villa. We had seen similar columns in Ephesus, Turkey last year.

The path then took us through old neighbourhoods past beautiful, old expensive looking homes clad in neutral stucco except for one home that was in a gorgeous shade of ochre. All of the driveways were over a small creek. Gardens were plentiful with marigolds, hydrangeas, geraniums, and interesting trees and shrubs. One tree we did see was a monkey puzzle tree, which is a pine species that grows out in Victoria, BC. It is called a monkey puzzle tree, as apparently monkeys can't climb them. Arriving back at the Cultural Centre after getting our books stamped we parted ways until the Opening Ceremonies that evening. That evening we watched folk dancing with our Ottawa friends who proudly wore their IVV Vice President Fan Club (Canada Chapter) t-shirts that Graham had made for all of us after Heather had earlier this summer joked that Graham's fans would be attending the Europiad.

On Saturday, our walk with friends Bruce and Connie from Ottawa who are now living in Holland began in Irrel, Germany up a steep roadway past apple trees, to an area outside the entrance to the park. There we saw two WW11 bunkers in the ground behind barbed wire, an underground war museum, and a huge bronze plaque on a stone monument to soldiers. After leaving this area we headed into the red pine forest of old growth trees, extremely tall specimens with sunlight dappling through the trees. After the checkpoint, we continued through the forest and came upon a small waterfall underneath a covered bridge. The coolness of the forest was wonderful. Along the way, we saw blue tents well below us, and beyond at an intersection were 6 conical shaped structures, which were camping huts for rent. We then passed a Biergarten, corn fields, a stream and apple trees then crossed a bridge to enter town and back to the finish. On the way into town, we passed a yard with a small wooden clothesline on the lawn complete with wooden storks on each end holding up the whole line. On the left stork was a tag announcing the name of a new baby girl. Multiple tiny t-shirts were clipped onto the clothesline. This public announcement is done throughout the region to announce anniversaries, births, and birthdays. The weather was again fabulous – 27 degrees with lots of sunshine and clear blue skies. We heard that there were 2,500 participants today.

Sunday's walk began in Echternach from the Cultural Centre once again and the theme was "the Mullerthal Trail". We decided to do the 12 km walk which first led us along the Sauer River. Connie looked over to the German side of the river to a lookout high above the ground and remarked how high it was. Guess what – our walk took us to that lookout through the red pine forest, up a mountain along narrow pathways that were at times slippery with moss, hanging on to iron handholds as we made our way up higher and higher. The elevation rose, the air got cooler and up to the lookout, across the mountain, down the other side to the checkpoint for a needed drink of water. Then off we went, joining the walkers from the 21 km walk, along a deep valley floor where water once ran, surrounded by huge sandstone formations at least 6 stories tall in an area called the Labyrinths, streams, and natural caverns. Then we climbed up and up again, then back down. We later found out that the walk was through what is called the Mullerthal Trail in the German-Luxembourgish Natural Park. It was a tough walk physically with spectacular scenery. The four hours it took to complete went by fairly quickly and I would recommend anyone to walk it if they should visit the area.


